5. Rewards for Receiving Disciples	40–42	Blessings for those who support the mission



## Historical & Cultural Context

- **"Sheep among wolves" (v.16):** A vivid image of vulnerability. Disciples were being sent to preach in a hostile environment where both **religious leaders** and **Roman authorities** could oppose them.
- **Synagogues (v.17):** These were not just places of worship but also local courts where punishments (like flogging) were administered.
- **Flogging (v.17):** 39 lashes (Deut 25:3). Paul experienced this (2 Cor 11:24).
- **Families Divided (v.21):** Loyalty to Jesus could rupture family bonds in a culture where familial honor was sacred.
- **Roman Trials (v.18):** Jesus foresees eventual testimony before governors and kings (e.g., Paul before Felix, Festus, Agrippa).
- **Rewards (vv.40–42):** Hospitality in ancient Israel was deeply tied to honor and solidarity.



## Key Greek Words & Phrases

Greek Word	English	Notes
πρόβατα ( <i>probata</i> )	Sheep	Symbol of innocence and vulnerability
φρόνιμοι ( <i>phronimoī</i> )	Wise/prudent	Describes serpents—implies strategic thinking
ἄκακοι ( <i>akakoi</i> )	Innocent/blameless	Describes doves—implies purity and sincerity
παραδῶσουσιν ( <i>paradōsousin</i> )	Will hand over	Used for betrayal; Judas "handed over" Jesus
ἀρνέομαι ( <i>arneomai</i> )	Deny	A strong word for disowning or rejecting (Peter)
ἀποκτενῶ ( <i>apoktenō</i> )	Kill	Highlights the intensity of persecution

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## Theological Themes

### 1. Cost of Discipleship

Jesus makes no attempt to sugarcoat the mission: it involves persecution, betrayal, and even martyrdom. Faithful witness may lead to death, yet eternal life is promised.

### 2. Divine Provision

Believers are not left alone. The Holy Spirit will give them the words to speak (v.20). This anticipates **Pentecost** and the **empowerment** of the church.

### 3. Fear vs. Boldness

Jesus repeatedly says, “Do not fear” (vv.26, 28, 31), challenging his disciples to choose **boldness** over **self-preservation**, even in the face of death.

### 4. Allegiance and Loyalty

Loyalty to Jesus surpasses family ties (vv.37–38). Carrying one's **cross** (v.38) is a call to **self-denial and total devotion**.

### 5. Eternal Rewards

Even small acts (like giving water) to Jesus' messengers are seen and rewarded. God notices every act of service done in faith (v.42).

## Old Testament Echoes

OT Text	Connection
Micah 7:6	Division in families due to moral and spiritual conflict
Psalm 56:3–4	Trusting God when afraid
Jeremiah 1:7–9	God puts words in the prophet's mouth—like the Spirit's help in v.20
Daniel 3 & 6	Bold witness before kings (Shadrach, Meshach, Daniel)
Isaiah 8:12–13	“Do not fear what they fear... fear the LORD”
