Jesus Teaches About the Coming of the Kingdom

Luke 17:20–37 – The Coming of the Kingdom and the Day of the Son of Man

Context & Setting

Jesus addresses two groups:

- Pharisees (vv.20–21) asking when the Kingdom will come
- **Disciples** (vv.22–37) warning about sudden judgment and return of the Son of Man

Verse-by-Verse Summary

12 Verse	 Summary	🧠 Key Insight / Word Study
v.20–21	The Kingdom of God isn't coming with visible signs—it's already in your midst .	Greek: entos humōn (ἐντὸς ὑμῶν) = within/among you (Jesus' presence = Kingdom now)
v.22–25	The days of the Son of Man will be longed for; don't be deceived by false messiahs.	Like lightning —visible, unmistakable. But first, the Son must suffer (v.25).
v.26–27	As in Noah's day : life was normal until the flood destroyed them all.	Life-as-usual blinds people to impending judgment .
v.28–30	As in Lot's day : life continued until fire rained from heaven.	Parallel to Son of Man's return—sudden and final.
v.31–33	Don't go back for possessions. Lot's wife is the warning. Lose life to save it.	Clinging to life = losing it. Let go and trust.
v.34–36	Two people side by side— one taken, one left.	Word study below: refers to sudden separation at judgment.
v.37	"Where?" – "Where the corpse is, the vultures will gather."	A proverb : Judgment's effects will be visible and unavoidable.

Time Phrase	↑ Verse	Context	♀ Meaning
"That day"	v.31	Don't turn back for anything	Urgency during visible judgment
"That night" v.34		Two in bed – one taken	Judgment spans globe – day and night occur at once

⚠ Implication: The Son of Man's return will be global, sudden, and final.

Word Study: "Taken" and "Left" (vv.34–36)

<u> W</u> ord	≝ Greek	Definition	Usage	Meaning Here
Taken	paralambanetai (παραλαμβάνεται)	To take along, receive	John 14:3 (positive); Matt 24:40 (judgment)	Likely taken in judgment (cf. Noah, Lot)
Left	aphietai (ἀφίεται)	To be left, abandoned	Used for release or forgiveness	Likely spared , not swept away

★ Since the context is judgment (Noah/Lot), the ones taken are likely those judged, not rescued.

Final Summary Chart

★ Theme	Explanation
₩ Kingdom	Already present in Jesus, not coming with visible signs (vv.20–21)
→ Return of Son of Man	Sudden, visible, like lightning (v.24); after suffering (v.25)
₹	Days of Noah and Lot – normal life, then swift judgment (vv.26–30)
O Don't Look Back	Lot's wife is the warning—don't cling to the past (v.32)
☼ Separation	One taken, one left—each judged individually (vv.34–36)
▼ Judgment Revealed	"Where the corpse is" – judgment will be obvious (v.37)
